We celebrated a number of events in the second term including Wellbeing Week, the Pupil Mini Fair, World Book Day and Seachtain na Gaeilge. We ended off the term with an Easter Egg Raffle and Egg Hunt organised by the PTA.

Our school hockey teams had a really successful hockey season thanks to the efforts of Neal Megarity and the PTA Hockey Committee. The year was capped off with 3 teams making it to their respective School's Cup Finals! Although none of the teams won those 3 finals, they all received well deserved medals for their achievement. Our senior boy's hockey team won their league this year and with so many strong players, we are sure to see them progressing in secondary school hockey and beyond. We had success too with the school Chess team, 'Whitechurch Kings and Queens',



who won the local area school tournament and then went on to perform very well in the Dublin and Wicklow finals.

Our Choir has gone from strength to strength this year with an increasing repertoire of songs and no less than two winning titles with the first being the Wesley College Interschool Music Festival Primary School Choir Competition. The school choir performed a beautiful two part harmony version of 'California Dreamin' along with their anthem- 'We're a Choir' to win the Navan Choral Festival Popular Music Competition. The choir are now looking forward to their well-deserved end of year Karaoke Party.



We had some unusual visitors in the school recently when we welcomed a mobile Reptile Zoo to the school for an educational and entertaining workshop. All pupils learned about a number of different creatures including snakes, spiders, chameleons, iguanas and turtles. Pupils and staff were given the opportunity to hold some of the creatures under the safe guidance of their keeper, Dave. It was a really enjoyable activity and a wonderful experience!





The school staff have been training up on the new Maths Curriculum that was introduced this year and we are really enjoying the increased emphasis on hands on activities and problem solving. We will be overhauling our maths equipment and buying new resources for each classroom shortly which will help us to implement the new curriculum. We have very recently taken delivery of 6 interactive touchscreens for the classrooms to replace the older projectors.

These screens have been bought using PTA funds and Fete funds supplementing BOM funds and we are very grateful to the PTA and parent body for their support. We hope to complete the transition for all remaining classrooms to touchscreens as soon as funds allow and we look forward to sharing photos of the new screens in use.

The Whitechurch Fete took place at the school at the end of April and it was a fantastic event much enjoyed by our pupils. Thank you so much to everyone who helped in any way to make it such a special day .

The Scouts kept everyone's energy up with sugary treats of sweets and candyfloss with hot popcorn too! Coffee was on hand outside thanks to Aidan Lonergan, and the Mother's Union set up their café once more with a beautiful selection of sandwiches and treats to munch on while customers sat and relaxed for a bit in the midst of the hustle and bustle of the day. The Bric a Brac and book stalls were in the hall and ably attended to by their respective stallholders. The cakes and deli, toys and clothes stalls, all staples of the Fete, were well stocked with donations and many a fashion bargain was picked up by keen shoppers under the expert guidance of Gillian Ryan and her team!

The Fete brochure was a bumper edition this year thanks to the efforts of the brochure team. It made a significant contribution to Fete funds due to the sheer volume of ads placed by local businesses and sponsorships. Our raffle too was stocked in advance with a huge number of prizes sourced by Heather Fenton and Zoe Phelan who set up and managed the online tickets and the draw. Sonia Champ and her team had a great set up with the Adult Tombola Bottle Stall with some really great bottles to be won!



The games tokens were a popular purchase and the lure of winning a golden homework pass proved too much for many pupils who competed at the various games stalls coordinated by the teachers including shuttle run, the transfer and washing line! The little ones enjoyed the hook a duck pond and 6th Class pupils were great sports as people queued up to throw wet sponges at them! (see front cover!!). Tom Jenner and his team of 'bouncers' organised a super competition on the Bouncy Castle and it wasn't empty for a minute for the whole Fete! Soccer shootouts, archery and more were also enjoyed throughout the afternoon. Face painting, tattoos and balloon animals were overseen by Ceoladh de Búrca and was a very popular tent outside.

Quizzers were kept on their toes by Dave Hunt's Fete Quiz and there was no fear of any trouble as we were well policed by no less than 5 Gardaí who supported the event and kindly let children (and some adults) have a turn in their van!



The BBQ was a massive operation that supplied customers with delicious burgers and hot dogs. The behind the scenes finance team who prepared floats and counted all the coins and managed the credit card machines did Trojan work and at the time of writing, it looks like

we have raised around **€19,000** after expenses- a more detailed breakdown will follow. This is an amazing result and one of the best amounts yet for a Whitechurch Fete!

Huge thanks are owed to our Co-Chairs of the Fete Committee- **Susan Ronan** and **Jenny Sherwin** along with their team, for putting together such a wonderful community event that not only raised vital funds for parish and school but also brought everyone together for such a great event! Thank you to the school staff and pupils for allowing the school to be turned upside down temporarily and for setting up the classrooms as stalls. The Fete was a massive effort and could not have gone so well without all of the support everyone in Whitechurch and beyond gave it through attendance, sourcing sponsorship and prizes, buying raffle tickets, donations, preparation, sorting, manning stalls and tidying up afterwards. Plans are already afoot for next year's Fete so if you have any suggestions or think you might be able to contribute to the organising committee, please let either the parish or school office know.

Mission Link—Rwanda

Good progress is reported from Rwanda with regards to the opening of the health centre.

All equipment is almost in place and inspection by the local health authorities is fixed for next Thursday, 9th May 2024. The team have been liaising ahead with them about the inspection and it appears that there should be no last minute surprises with it.

Following on from that, an Open Day is to take place the following week , to show the clinic to the local population. On that day free tests will be offered to those who attend, such as BMI measurements, eye and ear tests , blood pressure readings etc

It is then hoped that normal operations will commence in early June. We have agreed to finance wages for the first 6 months of operation, and we expect to disburse half these funds in June and the remainder in September.

We are at present beginning planning for our next inspection/ liaison visit to Shyogwe. It is hoped to visit in February 2024 during the half term break at Whitechurch National School, and that our group will include one of our teachers so that a good liaison can be established with the school there. Anyone who would have an interest in joining us should have a chat with any one of our committee as new bodies would be very welcome.
